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The European Society of Gynaecologic Oncology Endorses the Pearl of Wisdom as the Official Symbol of the Cervical Cancer Prevention Campaign in Europe

Cervical cancer remains an important cause of disease and death within Europe although we know exactly what we need to do to prevent almost every case of this disease. We know that organised cervical cancer screening of adult women can prevent up to 80% of cervical cancers and we also know that vaccination of adolescent girls to protect them against the two most common types of Human papillomavirus (HPV) can reduce cervical cancer rates even further.

However, two problems still prevent us from achieving this goal.

First, many European women still do not have access to these programmes because their political leaders are not aware of their importance and therefore have not prioritised their implementation. Second, even where these programmes are available, many women do not use them because they have not been made aware of their benefits. Raising awareness about the benefits of cervical screening and HPV vaccination is therefore essential to the prevention of cervical cancer.

Prof Vesna Kesić, President-Elect of the European Society of Gynaecologic Oncology, stated "Every year in Europe, 60,000 women develop and 30,000 die from cervical cancer when we already have the tools to prevent almost every case. A key priority must therefore be to raise awareness of the benefits of cervical screening and HPV vaccination. We must raise awareness among politicians so they prioritise the implementation of these programmes where they do not exist and we must raise awareness among the public so people use them where they are available. "

Prof Kesić continued, "Having an easily recognisable symbol that is unique to the Cervical Cancer Prevention Campaign is an essential element of a communications campaign and the European Society for Gynaecologic Oncology is proud to endorse it. We encourage all the organisations and people who are involved in cervical cancer prevention to join ESGO in adopting the Pearl of Wisdom as the symbol of the Cervical Cancer Prevention Campaign as this will greatly improve our abilities to raise awareness about cervical cancer prevention, to increase participation and thereby to prevent this cancer."

Following on from Prof Kesić, Dr Philip Davies, Director General of the ECCA, said "The pink ribbon is recognised and trusted around the world, and it has been central to the success of the Breast Cancer Campaign. Now we need the same thing for the Cervical Cancer Prevention Campaign. We must have a single symbol that is uniquely associated with the campaign so we can build the public recognition and trust that is essential for the campaign's success. The endorsement of the European Society of Gynaecologic Oncology, an organisation that is highly respected within the cervical cancer prevention community across Europe, is a very important advance for the Pearl of Wisdom and for the Cervical Cancer Prevention Campaign."
